

EUCHARISTIC ADORATION

Father Bill has heard our request and is offering 24 hour Eucharistic Adoration starting in the fall; every Monday after the 8 am Mass until Tuesday at 8 am. He is requesting that there be at least **three individuals** committed to every hour. Please sign-up on the sheet in the church vestibule. You will be contacted before the first Adoration begins. Thank you for spending time with Jesus.

For anyone who may not know Eucharistic Adoration is simply honoring the Eucharistic Presence of Christ. More deeply, it means “the contemplation of the Mystery of Christ truly present before us.”

The Eucharist is truly Jesus present, Body, Blood, Soul and Divinity. During Mass at the moment of Consecration, the bread and wine are transformed (transubstantiated) into the actual Body and Blood of Christ. This means that they are not spiritually transformed, but rather are actually (substantially) transformed into the Body and Blood of Christ. The elements retain the appearance of bread and wine, but are truly the actual Body and Blood of Christ. This is what is meant by Real Presence: the actual, physical presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. (And we have this happen at every Roman Catholic Mass! What a gift!)

Christ instituted this Holy Sacrament of the Eucharist in order to remain with mankind until the end of time (Jn. 14:18).

Because, we believe as Catholics, that Christ is truly and substantially present in the Eucharist, the Blessed Sacrament is given the same adoration and devotion that is accorded to Christ.

To begin Adoration, Father Bill will place the Sacred Host in the monstrance and place it on the altar for adoration by the faithful. *Monstrance* is the vessel used in the Church to display the consecrated Eucharistic Host. *Monstrance* come from the Latin word *monstratre*, meaning “to expose”. Then for 24 hours we will have an opportunity to visit with Jesus.

The purpose of this special hour is to spend time in prayer in the presence of the Blessed Sacrament. St. Teresa of Calcutta stated, “The time you spend with Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament is the best time you will spend on earth. Each moment that you spend with Jesus will deepen your union with Him and make your soul everlastingly more glorious and beautiful in Heaven, and will help bring about everlasting peace on earth.

The Church and the world have a great need for Eucharistic worship. Jesus awaits us in this sacrament of love. Let us not refuse the time to go to meet Him in adoration, in contemplation full of faith, and open to making amends for the serious offenses and crimes of the world. Let our adoration never cease. OUR FRIENDS THE SAINTS

Blessed Jolenta of Poland— Jolenta of Poland, also known as Yolanda of Hungary, was born in Hungary in 1235, the daughter of King Bela IV and Maria Laskaris whose father was the Greek emperor of Constantinople. Her family tree lists several saints: Hedwig of Andechs, Elizabeth of Hungary and Margaret of Hungary. When she was five years old, she was sent to Poland to be educated under the supervision of her older sister, (Blessed) Cunigunde, who was married to a Polish duke. Under Cunigunde's supervision she grew "in virtue and grace."

Jolenta married Boleslaus, duke of Greater Poland, and they had three daughters. In her position as duchess, she was able to help those less fortunate. Her husband joined her in her charitable works, so much so that he became known as Boleslaus the Pious. Together they built hospitals, churches and convents and helped widows and orphans. However, Boleslaus died in 1279.

After her husband's death, Jolenta and one of her daughters entered the convent of the Poor Clares at Sandec where she lived a life devoted to prayer and the Passion of Christ. After a while, war made them move to a convent that she and her husband had founded in Gniezno. There she reluctantly became the abbess. Her example of virtue made the convent flourish and the fame of her holiness and good works spread beyond the convent walls.

One day when Jolenta was meditating on the sufferings of Christ, the Crucified Jesus appeared to her and told her she would soon be taken to heaven. She became seriously ill and died on June 11, 1298. Many miracles are said to have occurred at her grave. She was beatified by Pope Leo XII in 1827. Her memorial is June 11 (or June 12 on some calendars).
